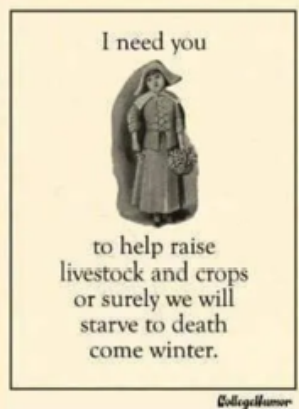
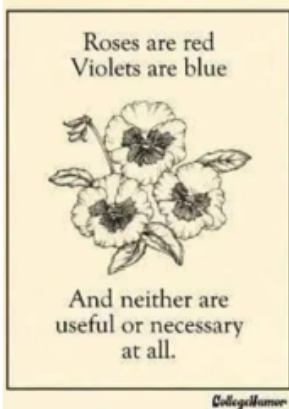

PETER'S PONDERINGS

It seems as though Christmas was just with us and the season of Epiphany has just arrived, and yet, in a flash, Lent will soon arrive. On February 14, in conjunction

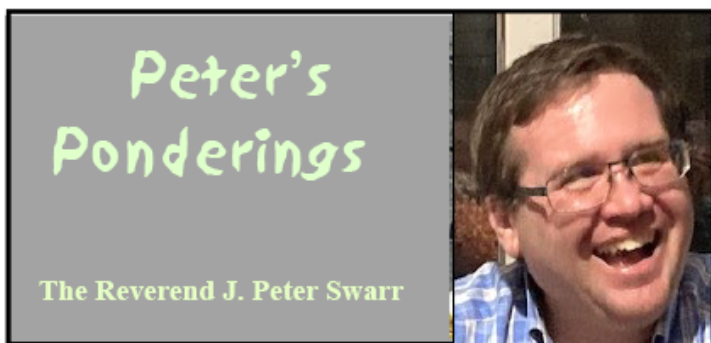


with Valentine's Day the season of Lent arrives bidding Christians to a time of intentional renewal and focus where we set our eyes upon Easter and our faith.

With Lent comes a very noticeable shift in the way worship and life at Trinity takes place. Our liturgy becomes more formal, with the opening of our service beginning with something called the penitential order. An unfortunate term, but ultimately something that asks us to turn our eyes to introspection and self-consideration, which seems quite appropriate in a season where we seek to grow closer to each other, our neighbor and a God who loves us.

At its heart, at its very *best*, penitence really is about

introspection and growth. It is NOT about a sense that we are unworthy or that we are judged. It is NOT about a God who looks at us and sees us as unloveable or unforgivable. The story of Christ, the story of God reaching out to humanity again and again and again is a story that tells us that WE ARE LOVED.

So I want to be sure that as we enter into this season of Lent with terms like sin and penitence, we are really clear what we are talking about here. We are talking about an opportunity for us to grow, to recognize where we can become more open to the LOVE and GRACE which is already waiting for us. We don't need to earn it or prove to God we are worth forgiving.

No. We are already forgiven and already loved.

This penitence, this season of intentionality, this season of preparation and fasting is about US opening *OURSELVES* to the love of God made known to us in Christ.

My hope and prayer as we enter into Lent, then, is that we all can experience Lent as an invitation to experience the pre-existing love and grace of God. To open ourselves to it and to make ourselves more open to being people who live in its embrace and guidance.

May this season of Lent be one of renewal and hope for you and may it help usher in a joyful Easter of celebration and joy for us all.

MEETING: Tuesday, January 16, 2024

During a January snow storm, the Vestry met via Zoom. After the minutes were passed (with one correction), the rector gave his report which included a long list of pastoral concerns. There are a number of parishioners in need of prayer and Peter ended this portion of his report with a prayer for the pain and hardship being felt in our community.

Peter also provided attendance numbers and reported that the first Sunday School gathering of the new year was snowed out. The State Street shelter is not ready to open as planned so Trinity's shift there will be moved into March, 10-16.

Peter was away last week on personal time and praised Paula Levier for holding down the office and managing everything in good style!

Peter spoke briefly about upcoming Adult Formation classes. Please see pages seven to nine and read about what is offered. Peter also spoke of rain damage from our recent torrential rain events! So also did our Jr. Warden, Bill Gordan.

Bill discussed a bathroom sump pump in the Day School, our noticeable roof leaks (chapel, kitchen, Peter's office) and

we will be seeking bids soon with the hope of being able to financially manage a new roof for Trinity. Our two bathroom floors are to have new flooring and new carpet is coming for the Forest Avenue entrance.

Bill Spear, Trinity's Treasurer, gave his routine report for January, reporting that for the year we had a surplus of \$14,010, not the projected deficit of \$13,482. This is great news. Bill explained (in reference to our need for a new roof) that we have already set aside \$17,000 in our Capital Improvement Fund and that our budget for the new year will enhance that fund, taking it to \$30,000. Still a drop in the bucket (pun intended) when one considers a new roof could cost \$100,000! We will be seeking bids and perhaps find one a little less painful!

The Vestry Retreat will be held at St. Mary's in Falmouth on Saturday, February 10, from 9-1 p.m.

A large amount of the meeting time was devoted to going through the Budget figures and in the end, the vestry voted unanimously to accept this proposed budget.

A motion was made, discussed, and then tabled to consider using our Easter and Christmas offerings and giving to a designated charity. More discussion needed, perhaps at the vestry retreat.

In closing, members heard nominations and voted on the Ruth Barnard Award .

Every year Lent rolls around...and just before Lent's arrival comes a day called *Shrove Tuesday* or *Fat Tuesday*...the day when Christians have traditionally held a party to prepare for Lent and get all the goodies out of the pantry which folks don't tend to eat during a long period of traditional penitential fasting.

These days, Lent isn't necessarily observed in the same way (with strict dietary fasting)...but the tradition of holding a Fat Tuesday gathering is a wonderful, fun way for us to mark the turning of this church season.

Last year we introduced "Jambalaya and Jazz." which resulted in delicious fun for all who attended. We hope to revisit that fun and musical/culinary flair this year on February 13. We'll repeat last year's format: Members of Trinity are invited gather in Lincoln Hall for dinner from 5:00-6:30 PM. We will have Jambalaya, pancakes, sausage, and ice cream sundaes. There will be music, singing, and activities for kids (who knows, maybe some dancing might break out, too...).

January 22-February 12

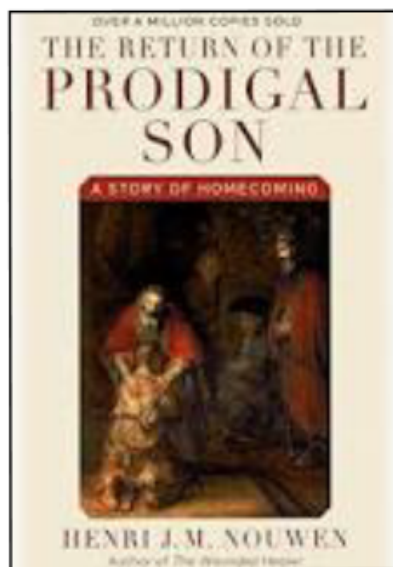

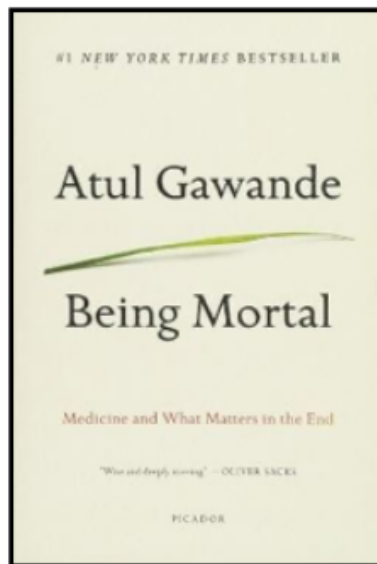
Adult Formation: Faithful Living and Faithful Dying

Begins on Monday, February 26.....

On Ash Wednesday, as ashes are placed on our foreheads, the prayer that is said is “remember that you are dust and to dust you shall return”. These are true words. But they also can be hard words. Most of us don’t really want to ponder our mortality. And yet, at the heart of Christian life is the call to be a people who follow in the path of Christ. And Christ lived fully aware of his death.

As such, Christians have long understood that we are called to a vocation of Holy Living and Holy Dying. Let me explain. We are called to live in such a way that we love God and love our neighbors, and also live in such a way that we consider that our days will end, that they are not limitless. And as such we are called to be good stewards of the time we have.

Our adult formation series this Lenten season will invite us to take time in this season of preparation and introspection to do a little consideration of what being a good steward of our limited lives might be like. We will do this in three distinct ways.



1) We will begin on Monday, February 26 at 6 p.m. by gathering in the Ogden Room to discuss the first six chapters of Atul Gawande’s critically acclaimed book *Being Mortal* which examines the inescapable realities of aging and death and how the medical system (Dr. Gawande is a renowned medical doctor) often fails folks as they face these challenges. We will finish the book discussion on March 4.

Adult Formation: Faithful Living and Faithful Dying

2. We will then turn our attention on March 11 to funeral planning and burial wishes.
3. March 18 we will consider other important advanced planning such as advanced medical directives and wills.

While this discussion may well seem morbid, it is in fact something that is key to Christian stewardship and is based in our hope and belief that our faith is a faith grounded in Resurrection hope. We are a people who believe that this earthly life does not have the final word, and thus our attention to these important questions is in fact a sign of our Christian faith and care for those who come after us.
